From the Executive Director

2023 was a come-back year for many people and organizations and we were no exception. Many of the health and resource fairs came back and we were there. PBH staff, board members and volunteers participated in 79 events (up from 36 in 2022).

In addition to Amarillo and Canyon events, PBH visited Hereford, Pampa, Miami, Friona, Wellington, Dumas, Spearman, Clarendon and Gruver. We'd like to visit even more communities in 2024. This would not be possible without a dedicated board and numerous volunteers for whom we are most grateful. YOU make breast health happen.

PBH strengthened partnerships with other organizations that offer cancer screenings through joint events and hosting our partners and other stakeholders for the 2023 Prevent Cancer Dialogue Virtual Series presented by the Prevent Cancer Foundation.

Continuing our partnership with BSA Harrington Breast Center and embarking on a new partnership with Pampa Regional Medical Center enabled us to serve more people. We continue to see a growing need for mammograms, especially among women who did not or could not get screened due to the pandemic.


This year, Panhandle Breast Health tackled some of the issues that keep people from getting their mammograms. A big improvement was the updated website providing a portal to English and Spanish applications. Anyone with internet service can apply at their convenience. About two-thirds of applications now come through the website.

Students with the Rogers LEAD WT program at West Texas A&M University redesigned the PBH website as Scholars in the Dyke and Terry Rogers Leadership Education and Development (LEAD) Program. This program challenges high-achieving students to further develop their leadership potential.

PBH recognizes that one of the roadblocks to screening is travel expense. Although the majority of recipients don't have to travel to Amarillo, come to our partner, others are faced with significant travel time. For 46 recipients, they drove a roundtrip of more than 100 miles. Fortunately through grant funds, we are able to provide gift cards to offset travel expenses.

Still traveling is time consuming and getting screening closer to home should be an option. PBH began a new partnership with Pampa Regional Medical Center in the Fall of 2023 to provide no-cost screening mammograms. In the first three months 18 women had received screening mammograms in Pampa. Undoubtedly, this program will continue to serve many more residents in the Gray County area in 2024.

Grants from several foundations enabled our screening program to achieve rapid growth. Through the Louise Bowers Slentz Fund (Amarillo Area Foundation), PBH continued the Positively Pink Program for Gray County and the surrounding eight counties. This helped PBH to partner with Pampa Regional Medical Center making no-cost screening mammograms more accessible to rural areas in the eastern Texas Panhandle.



AMARILLO AREA

This grant funded mammograms and other programs for residents of Armstrong, Carson, Donley, Collingsworth, Gray, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Roberts and Wheeler Counties.



The Prevent Cancer Foundation funded the Transcending Limits Cancer Screening Initiative to increase advocacy and screening rates for LGBTQ+ individuals. PBH proudly attended Amarillo's Pride Festival, hosted and attended multiple events and created educational resources to increase screening rates. These activities encouraged community members to get screened, not just for breast cancer, but for colorectal and cervical cancer as well. The City of Amarillo Public Health Department also made HPV vaccines available atvarious events. PBH continues to provide many



educational resources online and to work to improve screening rates.

A generous Potter County grant funded the Back on Track Breast Screening Initiative. The COVID-19 pandemic caused a delay in screenings for many women and this program works to get them back to their routine mammograms. The challenge was to re-establish the healthy habit of annual screenings.



Among other things, this grant enabled PBH to create an awareness campaign educating Potter County residents on the vital importance of breast cancer screenings. It also paid for 53 women to receive breast cancer screenings, helped navigate people into the health care system and provided resources connecting them to additional services such as cervical and colorectal cancer screenings.



Harrington Cancer and Health Foundation, the Women's Philanthropy Fund, and the C J & Syble Fowlston Trust, Panhandle Breast Health launched a new Rural Initiative. This provides funds for screenings, travel reimbursements and marketing. It was designed for Texas Panhandle residents who live outside of Potter County, especially in

move rural areas where mammogram screening rates are lower. Thus far, 30 women have received breast cancer screenings. The program continues into 2024.



Panhandle Breast Health set a goal of providing at least 100 no-cost breast cancer screenings to uninsured people in the Texas Panhandle in 2023. However, reality far exceeded expectations. Yet, we know that the need for no-cost services continues to grow and as the population ages so does the need for breast cancer screenings.

In 2022, PBH paid for 39 mammograms and procedures.



In 2023, that number more than quadrupled to 186!

In 2023, PBH provided more than \$300,000 worth of services to uninsured women who otherwise might not have gotten mammograms. PBH received 264 mammogram applications. 216 applications were sent in to BSA Harrington Breast Center and 48 were sent to Pampa Regional Medical Center.

Most people receive only a screening mammogram; however, others need a diagnostic mammogram, ultrasound and possibly a biopsy. Of the total 186 procedures in 2023, there were 133 screening mammograms, 50 diagnostic mammograms and two biopsies.

Demographics

Panhandle Breast Health is dedicated to lowering the number of breast cancer deaths, and one of the ways we work toward that goal is by providing education and resources to everyone we can. In 2023, the average age of women receiving mammograms was 50 years old. However, the youngest was 27 years old, and the oldest was 79.


There were 264 mammogram applications from 20 of the top 26 counties in the Panhandle. Out of the 186 procedures PBH paid for, 117 were completed in the same city the individual lived in while 62 individuals had to drive over 100 miles round trip just to get to their mammogram. Twenty-five women had to get more than one procedure done, with two individuals having to get three different procedures within the 2023 year.


PBH's contracts with BSA Harrington Breast Center and Pampa Regional Medical Center allow us to lower fees which enables us to help more people. Although most screenings are between \$200 and \$250 per person, multiple procedures exceed more than \$1,000 for a single individual.
